Traffic Calming Continues In Chartley

Chartley Drive speed humps are coming to calm traffic and slow speeders. Joseph Chester who lives on Chartley Drive spearheaded the effort working with Baltimore County Department of Public Works (DPW) to get the map with the locations. One will be in the 100 block, another at the intersection of Shirley Manor Drive which has been such a problem with accidents through the years and two through the 200 block. Joe was advised that the work will start shortly after July 1st when the new county fiscal year starts.

Glyndon Drive residents have spoken positively about the speed humps installed there earlier this

year. Traffic speed has become a bigger problem as people return to a new normal from the pandemic years. This is true not just in our town but also across the county and nation. Take your time everyone, this is your neighborhood and police reports indicate that when they give tickets it is most often to drivers who live in the neighborhood.

Crime In Chartley

June 2022 Mid-Year Report

While we continue to work with the police to get a replacement crime reporting website(s) to help us accurately track all the crimes that are reported in, and around, our community, so far this year we are only aware of 14 crimes that have been reported by Chartley residents since the first of the year. For the second year in a row, thefts (general as opposed to theft of/from vehicles, etc.) have been our number one concern. That was followed by non-domestic assaults. There was also one case of vandalism reported during this period. The chart shows a breakdown of the crimes reported from January 1st until June 27th as this article is being written:

The 14 crimes reported so far this year compared to 20 during the same period for both 2021 and 2020 I think that it's

important to note here that during 2020 and part of 2021, a lot of people were staying at home due to the pandemic, so the lower number of crimes reported so far this year by Chartley residents is a good step in the right direction. In addition to the 14 crimes noted so far this year, there have been a number of calls for police service during this period for such things as 'check on location,' suspicious person, and suspicious vehicle within our community. This is an indication that our residents are becoming more aware of their surroundings and calling 911 whenever they see something out of the ordinary. WAY

TO GO CHARTLEY!!!!

Prior to 2021, the most frequently reported crime within our community was theft from UNLOCKED

Vehicles. While this continues to be a MAJOR concern in the rest of Precinct 3, we are not aware of a single such incident reported by a Chartley resident so far this year! Another great step in the right direction!

Now for some things that the police have asked us to remind everyone about:

- First, there have been number of reports of thefts from sheds and garages, many of which occurred while the resident owner was working in his/her yard at the time! The police have asked us to remind us to always make sure that sheds and garages, and, of course, our homes, are kept locked, even when we are outside. It only takes a thief a few seconds to get inside, take what they want, and leave while we are busy cutting the grass or pulling the never-ending weeds!
- Speeding is still a major concern throughout the entire area, including Chartley. Up until several months ago, speeding on Glyndon Drive was a major concern within our community. Thanks to the efforts of CHA, speed bumps were installed on this street which has helped the speeding problem tremendously. Now, thanks to the independent efforts of a resident of Chartley Drive, it looks like speed humps are very likely to be installed there within the very near future. Congratulations and

thanks for the efforts of that resident. This will also greatly help slow traffic on that street as

well. Over the past several months, we have noticed the police issuing speeding citations within our community. This too, has helped the situation. But, we must continue to work to get speeding under control.

• Catalytic converter theft is still occurring within the entire County, but seems to be slowing down a bit. Never the less, the police recommend that everyone try to park their vehicles in well illuminated areas at night. Thieves do not like light!

Outdoor security cameras continue to prove their value in both preventing crimes (as well as reducing the number of unwanted sales people from knocking on our doors, and in helping to solve crimes when they occur. These cameras provide real time high-

definition quality pictures, sound, the ability to talk to people entering the camera's range, night vision, all of which is easily accessed by your cell phone wherever you may be at the time. A number of Chartley residents have indicated that they have now installed such cameras around their homes, and we continue to strongly recommend that every resident consider acquiring cameras. They provide another level of security around our homes and are well worth the nvestment.

OK, we are off to a good start so far this year. Now, let's keep it up. Of course, zero crimes at all times will always be our goal. So always keep the following Crime Prevention Tips in mind every day in order to keep your homes and loved ones safe:

- Lock it up, each time, every time.
- Keep the outside of your house illuminated after dark.
- Strongly consider the installation of home security cameras around your property.
- Never leave your vehicle running unattended.
- Never leave valuables in your vehicles.
- Never leave the keys to any property inside your vehicle.
- Be aware of your surroundings wherever you are, particularly when you are outside or shopping after dark.
- NEVER, EVER, FOR ANY REASON, GIVE ANY PERSONAL INFORMATION WHATSOEVER TO ANYONE UNTIL YOU HAVE VERIFIED THE SOURCE FIRST
- If in doubt, let the police check it out!
- If you see something, say something! Call 911 each time, every time.
- Remember that if you don't call 911, there will not be a police response... no response... no police follow up to prevent further crimes...MAKE THAT CALL, EACH TIME, EVERY TIME. And call 911 even if you do make a mistake and the criminals take advantage of you. Never be too embarrassed to make that call. You could be helping someone else by allowing the police to start closing the ring on the criminals. MAKE THAT CALL!

Exercise In The Park

A few days ago, I had the pleasure of meeting Lynette and Daniel Trawick, a young transplant couple from Philadelphia. When they moved to Reisterstown last September, they resolved to do at least one important thing: become a force for positive mental and physical health in our community. They are accomplishing this by offering free exercise classes for anyone and everyone who wants to attend.

Their **Exercise In The Park** program takes place three times a week: once at Hannah More Academy at 6:00 pm on Tuesday and twice at the Reisterstown Regional Park on Mitchell Drive, on Tuesdays and Thursdays at 12 noon. Everyone is invited to participate in the hour-long classes – you just need to show up. Lynette and Daniel structure the exercises according to the participants' abilities, so whether you are 40, 50 or 60, they won't let you overdo or over-stress your muscles. They will also give one-on-one instruction if anyone needs it.

Lynette realized just before COVID struck that she needed an outlet for her own stress and feelings of anxiety. A friend suggested exercise, which she undertook and quickly realized she loved it and loved what daily exercise was doing for her body and mind. She became committed to passing this feeling of wellbeing on to others.

Besides the exercise, Lynette and Daniel run a mobile nutrition club, which offers meal replacement protein shakes and herbal energy teas. You can find them on **Facebook** (videos and fliers) and **Instagram** @**Transformation.Wellness**, but the best way to experience their joy and energy is to visit the classes in person!

Note: Look for their table at National Night Out this August.

Festivals promote diversity, they bring neighbors into dialogue, they increase creativity, they offer opportunities for civic pride, they improve our general psychological well-being. In short, they make cities better places to live.

Reminder

Do not rake or blow leaves (or other yard materials) into the public street. It is a violation of County Code Section 18-3-109 to place leaves, grass, or other debris into a County street or in storm drains. Such unlawful acts may result in fines being issued.

(1988 Code, § 31-10) (Bill No. 3, 1990, § 2; Bill No. 66-01, § 2, 7-1-2004; Bill No. 73-03, § 30, 7-1-2004):

A person may not place, deposit, cast, or throw on or into any road, street, sidewalk, lane, alley, bridge, or drain in the county:

- (1) Any metal, wood, glass, nails, grass clippings, leaves, or other object or article; or
- (2) Any dead animal, offal, garbage, ashes, fruit, dirt, filth, rubbish, noxious fluid or substance, or refuse of any kind.




